Guidelines for the First Paper

The first draft is due Wednesday, February 26th.

Papers should be roughly five pages long, and should be submitted *both* as a hard copy and an e-mail attachment in Word format.

If you want to choose a topic other than those suggested below, please send your proposed topic to me via e-mail by Friday.

Suggested topics

- 1. Summarize Locke's various arguments against absolute monarchy in his *Second Treatise of Government*. For each argument, carefully explain the reasoning he uses.
- 2. Explain Locke's conception of natural law as expressed in his *Second Treatise of Government*. According to him, how can natural law be discerned? What are the natural laws that he asserts, and what bearing do they have on political and economic questions?
- 3. In his *Discourse on the Origin of Inequality*, what is Rousseau's purpose in describing man in the state of nature? How does this allow Rousseau to analyze the origins of social inequality?
- 4. Retrace Rousseau's account of the (roughly sequential) development of human civilization in his *Discourse on the Origin of Inequality*. According to Rousseau, what benefits and costs to humanity have resulted from these changes?
- 5. Contrast the views of property expressed in Locke's *Second Treatise of Government* and Rousseau's *Discourse on the Origin of Inequality*. Focus on the origin of property rights, the legitimacy of property rights, and their consequences for society.
- 6. How might the insights of Locke in his *Second Treatise of Government* and Rousseau in his *Discourse on the Origin of Inequality* contribute to the design of a political or economic system? On what points might the two authors be in agreement, and on what points might they be in conflict?
